Marc Asnin

A documentary photographer and anti-death penalty activist, he is the moving force behind the book and project Final Words. Some places are life-defining. The streets of Brooklyn in the '60s & '70s defined Marc Asnin. He was formed in a Goodfellas world where every family had a wise guy, and his was Uncle Charlie. Asnin explains odds were you either became a gangster or a cop, and what they both had in common was being great storytellers. Asnin chose the middle ground and became a different kind of storyteller. His subjects are people with broken dreams and disappointments who have the resiliency to find slivers of happiness in their oppressed existence. Asnin's images are unapologetic yet empathetic. Asnin recognizes the central role of the written word in telling these stories. It is a collaboration of sorts: their words and Asnin's images. We witness this in his book Uncle Charlie, an ultra-personal diary. The book uses imagery and the written word to portray a dark chronicle of misplaced hero

worship and heroic survival. Asnin's photographic style is determinedly old-fashioned, a fly-on-the-wall. Asnin chronicles one man's descent into a prolonged purgatory of his own making through intense images. Wisely, he allows Uncle Charlie to recount his own tale in vivid and always revealing remembrances.



Carmen Avcioglu

Carmen is a pharmacist living in Andover, MA. Carmen was born and raised in Puerto Rico, where she became a pharmacist. She moved to Boston, MA, during her mid-twenties to expand her professional and personal horizons. She has continued her career as a pharmacist in several diverse areas in fields like Hospital, Pharmaceutical Sales, HIV Specialty Pharmacist, Home Infusion, and the latest, as Community Pharmacist. Heather Barry



Previous winners include the Dalai Lama, Barbara Kingsolver, and Thich Nhat Hanh. Reclaiming the Sacred is a vital asset for anyone concerned about the global climate disaster or the vast environmental destruction caused by humans worldwide. This book explores the cultural and psychological underpinnings of the materialism that drives much of this

destruction. The book explores the psychology of happiness- those factors that contribute to human well-being—far more than money and possessions—and the psychology of money- the ways money nonetheless hooks so many of us. It explores the immense costs of materialism, particularly global warming, and points the way beyond materialism toward healthy and integrated relationships with ourselves, each other, and nature. But it's also so much more than that—a deep dive into love, belonging, and spirit.

James G. Hershberg, professor of history and international affairs at George Washington University in Washington, D.C., is a historian of the Cold War and the nuclear arms race. His first book, James B.
